

'IVYBANK'

GARDEN 1 – 369 BRACKENDALE RD ALLEN & COLLEEN GREEN

"Ivybank" garden was first established in the late 1800's by the Green family. It was originally very much a traditional cottage garden of the time. It consisted of gravel paths lined with plantings consistent of the time such as gladioli, dahlias, and carnations. Other early plantings were camellias, bottle brush and some roses. The elm tree in the north-east corner of the garden was one of four planted to mark the boundary of the original selection.

The garden was extensively extended in 2000. It was really done without any real plan but now features vintage machinery sourced from the property.

Plants of note include a Wollemi Pine, succulents, rhododendrons. There is also a very productive Meyer lemon tree planted on the northern aspect of the house which has defied Walcha's harsh environment.

There have been some very steep learning curves and the feel there is a non-existent garden during the winter months. This all changes in October when the garden springs to life. Of course, I had to move the fence out to increase the size of the garden!!!While we planted a few trees in the back area, the established trees that were here when we arrived, gave the garden character and protection. The pines planted on the western side of the garden. offer both shade from the summer sun and help reduce the wind effect which has proved brutal during our August wind tunnel times. I love propagating so my garden is a repeat display of existing plants. I am trying to introduce plants that flower throughout the different seasons so that I have colour for at least of the seasons. "Banchory" was one the original property and is now split into "Banchory", "Huntly", and "Old Banchory". We purchased "Old Banchory" in 2001. Over the years we have modified the garden by demolishing old sheds and the removal of a cottage. The garden has been extended to include large areas of sweeping lawn. The rock wall, split rail fencing and garden featured have been added by Allan. The garden edging ensures easier maintenance as we have both worked off farm. The focal point we believe of our garden is the Giant Redwood (Sequoiadendron) tree.

The Buxus hedging, photinia and nandina plants ensure the garden has greenery and seasonal colour all year round. Many of the gardens consist of perennials such as catmint, lambs' ear, daisies, salvias, red hot pokers, snow-in-summer, ornamental grasses, roses and a scattering of bulbs throughout the garden. We hope you enjoy our garden which is forever evolving.

GARDEN 5 - 13 LAKES RD **DANIFI & CARNIE KERMODE**


"Orandumbie" homestead was built in 1863, and the gardens were established shortly after this.
